

Access to decent work as a pathway to rural women's empowerment

- Many rural employment forms
- 2. The market and the non-market strongly interconnected
- 3. Women's paid employment reduces poverty but does not always lead to emancipation
- 4. Decent work deficits acute for rural women
- Need for a mix of integrated and contextspecific policy measures
- 6. Non-farm jobs not always a better option
